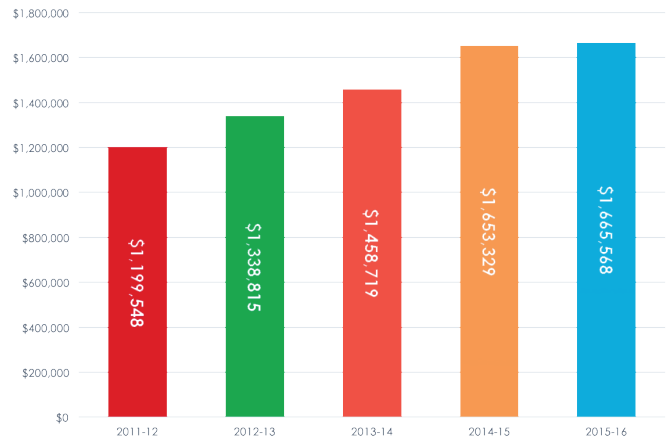

What is the WASD Education Foundation?

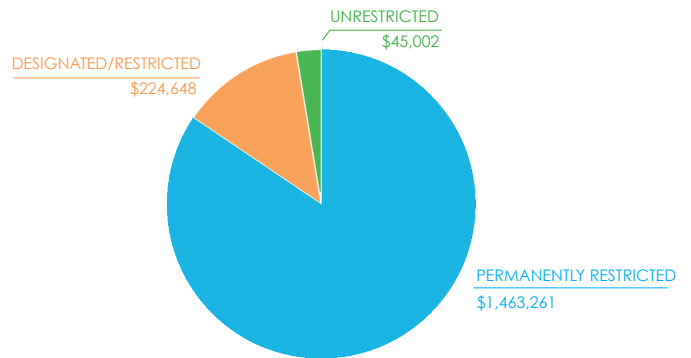
The Williamsport Area School District Education Foundation is a recognized nonprofit affiliate of the Williamsport Area School District. Led by a 20-member volunteer board, the Foundation facilitates charitable giving and permanent legacies based on individual areas of interest in educational innovation, the arts, athletics and scholarships. For more than a decade, WASDEF has been supporting students and teachers across the district with the financial resources provided by donors. Over the past five years, WASDEF has both raised and allocated more than \$1.6 million to the district in support of capital projects, programs, initiatives and scholarships. In that same time period, the Foundation has grown by \$466,000. This year's disbursements by program area from the Foundation are shown at right.

GROWTH IN ASSETS



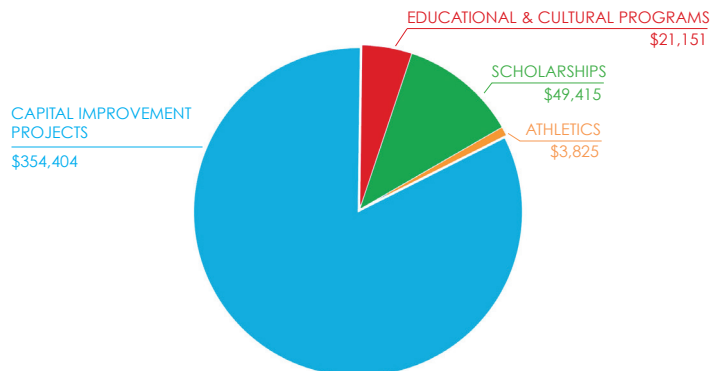
ASSETS BY FUND TYPE

Impact: Grant Dollars at Work



The WASD Education Foundation received a generous \$5,000 grant from the Harry Plankenhorn Foundation, which is being used to support the Central Pennsylvania Food Bank's Backpack Program at WAHS.

A hands-on opportunity in school citizenship and service for Williamsport Area High School life skills students is helping to alleviate hunger and improve the educational experience for some of their peers.

In partnership with the Central Pennsylvania Food Bank, the high school launched a Backpack Program in September, which provides a bag of nonperishable food at the end of each week to participating students to take home and eat when school meal programs are unavailable.

"The Central Pennsylvania Food Bank is thrilled to be partnering with the

Williamsport Area School District to provide backpacks," the organization said at the time. "One out of five students faces food insecurity in their home. As studies have shown, children who are food insecure tend to struggle more with their studies. By providing access to these students, we are helping them overcome one of the obstacles to their health and education."

One of the key components of the program is having life skills students handle the delivery of donated food, stock and manage the inventory, and fill the backpacks ahead of distribution every

Friday or before a long break.

Each bag is typically packed with two breakfast options, two lunch options, juice boxes, and two snack options — one can of fruit and one can of vegetables.

In its first year, more than 50 students enrolled in the program.

“Many of our students not only come to school hungry but also leave our buildings to later go hungry at home, either for the overnight hours, a full weekend or an extended holiday break,” said district social worker Heather Way.

The marriage of the program with the school’s life skills curriculum helps provide an authentic, real-world experience for those students.

“What a partnership opportunity,” said Pamela Hicks, the food bank’s program coordinator. “We are on a bold journey to close the meal gap by 2025 and,

with the help of community partners, like WAHS, we are confident that we can bridge the gap of food insecurity.”

Head Principal Brandon Pardoe also recognizes the value and significance of the collaboration and its benefit to students.

“It is a program that will enhance positive school outcomes for our students, which may lead to better performance on exams and improved overall health,” Pardoe said.



‘Thank You for Investing’

A grant-funded program launched this year at WAHS helped to redefine Tymir James’ future. Through mentorship, cultivation of new skills and the discipline gained in operating and managing the school’s mobile Alabaster Coffee station, the 2017 grad has newly-found aspirations for life after high school and developed the confidence to pursue them.

In 2015, WASDEF was awarded a \$10,000 grant from Williams’ Atlantic Sunrise Community Grant Program to support the launch of a Franchise Development Program at WAHS.

In partnership with Alabaster Coffee Roaster & Tea Co., the program was implemented this year to provide a real-world, hands-on opportunity in the instruction of small business ownership and operation.

Tymir was able to work alongside the business owner and WAHS alumnus Karl Fisher ‘01 as the program came to life.

“Participating in the development of the Alabaster franchise has helped me in my day-to-day life with skills I have picked up and can bring with me into my future and use in fields I aspire to be in,” he said. “A year-and-a-half ago, I could have been labeled a drop out. Not only am I finishing strong but I will now be the first in my family to attend college. I am more than confident that I will be successful in my journey. To all of you who have helped me along the way, thank you for listening, thank you for investing, and, most of all, thank you for coming to work each day determined to make dreams like mine become a reality.”

Teacher Mini-Grant Program Funds Classroom Innovation

Seven programs were funded through WASDEF's annual Teacher Mini-Grant Program. The Teacher Mini-Grant Program is designed to give teachers the opportunity to enhance curriculum and instruction through compelling, innovative programs on an annual basis. The Education Foundation awarded \$5,450 to fund four of the programs, while \$4,353 funded three programs through Educational Improvement Tax Credit (EITC) dollars at the First Community Foundation Partnership of Pennsylvania.

Jackson Math Stairs, Jackson Primary

Basic math facts were mounted to the risers of steps throughout the school so students can practice their fact fluency and improve recall as they navigate the building, thanks to Mrs. Diane Franzen's vision.

The Colors of LVIS, Lycoming Valley Intermediate

Working with art teachers Mrs. Julie Hammond and Mrs. Lori Moore, 250 sixth-grade students worked to create a permanently installed mural.

Jewelry Fabrication, WAHS

Art teacher Mr. Kevin Werner arranged for Artist-in-Residence Clint Varner to work with juniors and seniors to learn about jewelry fabrication techniques in a re-launch of the school's jewelry program.

Coding the "Super Power", Lycoming Valley Intermediate

Students in Ms. Elizabeth Long's fifth-grade classroom used STEM concepts to learn coding with 18 Ozobots, small path-following robots.

Students as Authors and Illustrators, WAHS

A partnership between the high school special education and art departments, 40 students wrote and illustrated a 20-page children's book.

Fairy Folklore: "A Midsummer Night's Dream", WAHS

Students in Mrs. Jessica Keeler and Mrs. Ippie Hellberg's English classes learned the history of fairy lore in the Shakespearean comedy and created mini fairy gardens in partnership with the horticulture department.

3D Archaeology Lab, Williamsport Area Middle School

Students in Mr. Dustin Brouse's social studies classroom were able to "bring to life" ancient artifacts and signature seals in their research using 3D printers.

'Inspiring Futures, Creating Powerful Classrooms'



Answering the call to "inspire futures and create powerful classrooms," 40 donors helped WASDEF raise \$11,593 during Raise the Region on March 8 and 9 that will be used to support the 2017-2018 Teacher Mini-Grant Program. The 30-hour online giving event, which celebrated its fifth year in 2017, is hosted by the First Community Foundation Partnership of Pennsylvania. Since 2013, the annual event has allowed WASDEF to generate more than \$41,000 in unrestricted gifts that have helped to benefit capital improvement and educational programming.



Funding Helps Grow Elementary Libraries' Collection

Since 2011, WASDEF has provided more than \$18,000 to the elementary library system to help grow its inventory in partnership with the James V. Brown Library's Summer Reading Program.

Annually, funding is used to purchase new books to recognize and honor kindergarten to sixth-grade students who successfully complete the program. Each book purchased is dedicated to a summer reader who then donates it to his or her respective school library. This year, 118 new books were purchased as a result of summer reading efforts.

Through 2016, the Foundation has gifted 858 new books, and, this year, it hopes to meet or surpass 1,000.

her gratitude to the Foundation, noting that the Foundation “continues to make a huge difference in the lives and learning” of district students.

“It truly is a solid foundation, which has been used to launch and build so many amazing, innovative and inspiring student-centered programs,” Bohnert said. “The WASD elementary libraries have greatly benefited from its generous support. This grant encourages many of our students to read throughout the summer. The foundation has consistently demonstrated its support by providing ongoing literacy opportunities through the summer and by contributing nearly 860 new books for our libraries.”

“(The partnership) is a great way for our two community organizations to combine resources to encourage children to build a lifelong love of reading,” said Barbara McGary, executive director of the James V. Brown Library.

“Our goal with this partnership was to not only promote summer literacy alongside the district but to also get new books in the libraries,” said Foundation Executive Director Greg L. Hayes, Jr. “It’s also a way to pay tribute to the students who are working to help build their libraries while leaving behind a legacy of sorts to future students.”

Odyssey of the Mind

The Williamsport Area School District Education Foundation continues to support the district's Odyssey of the Mind teams.

Last spring, the Foundation granted \$6,433 to support teams headed to the World Finals at Michigan State University.

A combination of 18 gifts received from those in the community, area businesses and the Foundation's unrestricted fund comprised the grant to the teams.

Of the seven WASD Odyssey of the Mind teams, two from Curtin Intermediate and WAHS qualified to advance to the World Finals after competing at the state competition in April.

The teams competed on the world stage at Michigan State University in May, with WAHS placing 14th and Curtin 22nd.

During the 2015-2016 school year, 16 Williamsport students from Lycoming Valley and WAHS were just as successful in the program's regional, state and global competitions. Those teams competed at the University of Iowa, during which the WAHS teams ranked within the top



15 spots, earning sixth and 14th place.

With the generous support of donors, the Foundation will continue to assist academic competitions, like Odyssey of the Mind, to enhance the learning experiences of our students.

Odyssey of the Mind is a competition that blends creativity, engineering and teamwork. It is 100 percent student-directed, with adult coaches acting as guides.

Why I Support the Foundation

Every year, the WASDEF benefits from the support of the faculty, staff and administration of the school district through its payroll deduction program. In 2016-2017, 160 employees contributed \$54,477 to the Foundation.

Among those who give annually through that program — and contributes to her late husband's scholarship fund beyond her payroll deduction — is Deborah Antonetti-Hill, who teaches early childhood education at WAHS.

"My reasons for giving to the Education Foundation are very near and dear to my heart," she said. "My late husband, Dr. Thomas Antonetti, and I felt that it was important for us to support the education of our daughters, who attended schools in the WASD, by both volunteering and contributing financially. Our daughters had wonderful teachers and received the foundation that they needed to pursue their dreams.

Return to Glory Capital Campaign: Legacy Garden

A partnership with the Pennsylvania College of Technology brought to fruition a project three years in the making, providing a permanent home to the engraved legacies of the Williamsport Area School District community.

Penn College students from Dr. Michael Dincher's Landscape/Horticulture class (shown at right) constructed the garden through the spring semester as part of the class's annual community project.

The *Return to Glory* Legacy Garden at STA Stadium is home to commemorative bricks donated as part of the Foundation's five-year capital campaign to restore the stadium. The Legacy Garden provides an ongoing opportunity to honor or memorialize a loved one.

More than 250 bricks have been gifted through the commemorative brick program, accounting for more than \$25,000 of the nearly \$2.35 million raised to date.

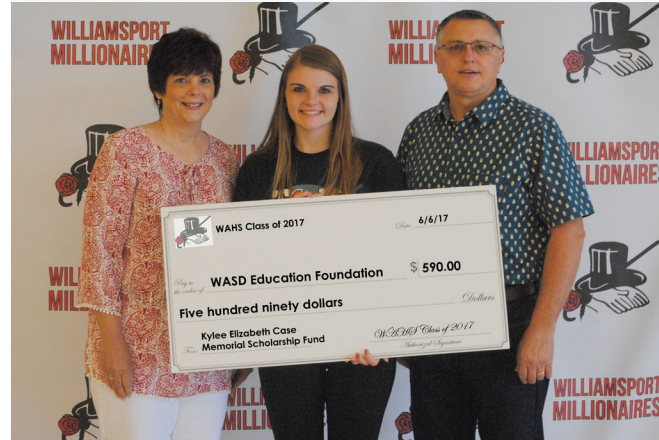

The Kylee Elizabeth Case Memorial Scholarship Fund Established

"Kylee had a gift of making everyone she met feel important."

Those are the words used by Timothy and Joni Case to describe their daughter, Kylee, soon after establishing a scholarship fund at the WASDEF in her memory.

"The contributions for the scholarship fund are a reflection of that gift," they added.

Kylee was 17 years old and a senior at WAHS with a passion for music until her untimely death in November 2016 as a result of an automobile accident.

Her parents describe her as personable, outgoing and selfless in helping others.

According to her parents, Kylee had picked a quote for graduation: "Every adventure requires a first step."

In appreciation of Kylee's memory — a life led by virtues of compassion and love — and to honor her in perpetuity, her parents established the Kylee Elizabeth Case Memorial Scholarship Fund. The scholarship will be awarded each year to a WAHS band member who has made a commitment to a college or the military.

"Now," her parents said, "she can be a part of every senior's first step."

3 Receive 2016 Distinguished Alumni Awards

Samuel E. Belle '52, Dr. Frederic Sanford '58 and William E. Stroup '46 were recognized and presented with WASDEF's 2016 Distinguished Alumni Awards.

Belle, a 1952 grad, received the Distinguished Alumni Service Award for his dedication to improving the lives of children, youth and families. He has provided his mentorship of young athletes and made selfless contributions to the Williamsport community that span more than five decades.

He continues to coach track-and-field, cultivating numerous district and state champions, while also volunteering in the nonprofit and collegiate communities.

A 1958 graduate, Sanford received the Distinguished Alumni Humanitarian Award for his demonstration of leadership in the field of radiology in the military for the betterment of the country. Sanford's military decorations include the Legion of Merit with five Gold Stars, Meritorious Service Medical and Combat Action Ribbon. He retired for a second time as the executive director of the Association of Military Surgeons of the

United States in 2005.

Stroup, a 1946 grad, received the Distinguished Alumni Achievement Award for his dedication over the past 35 years to an endeavor that began more than 60 years ago in Antarctica. Enlisted in the U.S. Navy, he spent his military career with the Naval Construction Force. In 1955, he volunteered for Operation Deep Freeze to build research stations in Antarctica in a quest to support scientific research and gain a Cold War advantage. As a result of his work and dedication, Stroup became the namesake of an Antarctic mountain in 2008 — Stroup Peak.

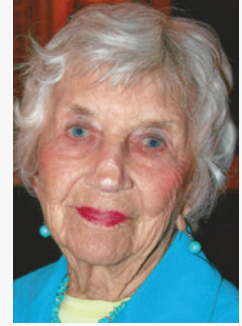

Shirley L. Dieffenbach Scholarship Award Fund Established

Of her 32 years in education, Shirley L. Dieffenbach served as an art teacher for 28 of them within the Williamsport Area School District before retiring in 1980.

While she left her passion for the classroom behind, her heart — and the core of her family's foundation — remained with the district.

The Dieffenbach family's history with WASD began in 1946, when a then-Shirley Lengel met her future husband and fellow teacher, Fred, at Roosevelt Junior High School. The two were married for more than 62 years before his death in 2008.

Shirley's legacy now lives on in perpetuity at the very place where it all began.

The Shirley L. Dieffenbach Scholarship Award Fund was established by the Dieffenbach family shortly after she passed away in March at the age of 97.

With her parents having met and taught at WASD and having come up through the district as students themselves, her daughter, Linda Lundy, and son, George, knew choosing WASDEF to carry on that legacy of art appreciation in her name "was a perfect match."

The scholarship will help students who display academic and creative excellence pursue a degree in art education or the fine arts.

According to Shirley's daughter, the fund will help carry on her mother's legacy in art education as well as an appreciation of the arts and the satisfaction that comes from creating.

'Virtual' Classrooms

Imagine taking students across the globe or bringing to life landscapes from literature or giving them the ability to watch an atom split right in front of their eyes — all without leaving the classroom — or their seat, for that matter.

That's exactly what Mr. Dan Woleslagle is doing with his sixth-grade students at Lycoming Valley Intermediate School.

Woleslagle has embedded virtual reality into his instruction and it's offering an innovative way to bring lessons to life.

The devices are used across nearly every discipline from social studies to science. In addition to increased student engagement, the devices help to bring a stronger understanding of the theoretical through real-life application, while also increasing technical literacy skills.

The devices also are being used as a stronger research tool that connects with STEM (science, technology, engineering and math) concepts explored at higher grade levels that have the potential to feed into the Career and Technical Education Program at the high school.

Woleslagle said it's familiarizing students with an emerging technology that's starting to make its way into fields of work, such as the medical and engineering industries.

The devices have a direct relevance and application to what they're learning today, while also preparing them for their futures — either educationally or in future career choices.

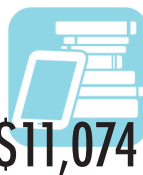
The EITC grant included the purchase of 30 16 GB iPod Touch devices, a charging cart and 30 Google Cardboard VR Goggles.

Educational Improvement Tax Credit Program at WASD

The Pennsylvania Educational Improvement Tax Credit (EITC) Program is administered by the state Department of Community and Economic Development (DCED) under Act 48. Established in 2001, the program awards tax credits to businesses that make contributions to scholarship organizations and/or educational improvement organizations that are on a list approved and published by DCED.

The WASD Education Foundation actively pursues EITC dollars from approved businesses and identifies eligible programs for funding on behalf of the school district. EITC funds for WASD are held at and administered by the First Community Foundation Partnership of Pennsylvania (FCFP). Since 2012, \$123,917 have been donated to WASD through the EITC program.

In 2016-2017, \$21,699 were granted to six WASD programs, supporting educational technology and cultural programs.
